such as HOH, Youth Angler Program and planned Striped Bass Derby. We also raised some funds to support these activities. Thank you to all the volunteers.







Did you know that the H.R.F.A. created *the world's first* Riverkeeper? It's true. Robert H. Boyle's dream became a reality when the Hudson River Fishermen's Association (formed in 1966) launched its *Riverkeeper* vessel in 1983. The 25-foot wooden boat, tasked with patrolling the Hudson for polluters, was initially piloted by Capt. John Cronin. Up until Oct. 5, 2019 the original Hudson River Fishermen's Assn's *Riverkeeper* boat was all but forgotten; rotting away in the woods in Garrison, NY. Now she is at Liberty Landing Marina in Jersey City awaiting her total makeover.

The crowd was informed by George about where to park and how to use a four wheel drive vehicle with aired down wheels in the sand so you shouldn't get stuck. (With a humorous tale about fools who don't listen). Valve kits, pumps and other items to carry were shared to make folks better surf anglers who use their vehicles in the sand regularly. It might be worth your efforts getting the \$195 NJ State Mobile Sport Fishing Permit.

WINTER SHOWS: A CHANCE TO LEARN AND GROW By Carl Bruger

By the time you read this article there have already been several great shows in the area that have given ardent anglers a chance to bone up on new angling techniques, see prospective fishing travel destinations, buy new lures, flies, rods, reels and every gizmo under the sun and moon!

But it's not too late by a long shot! There is nothing that beats cabin fever like driving to one of these shows with a full wallet and dreams of new gear and tactics that will mean trophies in the boat or flopping on the sand. The two best shows are upcoming at the end of February and in March!

I'm referring to the World Fishing and Outdoor Expo or "Suffern Show" or "Rockland Show" as it is known to many over the years. This year the four day event runs from Thursday February 27 th through Sunday March 1 st. Then there is the Salt Water Expo spectacular down in Edison. This three day event starts on Friday, March 13 th and concludes on Sunday March 15 th . Each of these extravaganzas pack plenty of booths full of gear and goodies that can set an angler's heart palpitating like when you first fell in love or nailed your first trophy mount.

If you are in the mood for a trip to a great fishing vacation there will be aisles of booths where charters await and qualified captains can book you on the dates you wish. You have options all the way to the Amazon and Alaska back to local fresh and salt water hot spots. Use your personal budget to determine recreational spending because the range can be radical from a tank of gas to thousands of dollars! Do your

homework and view the trips and videos taken by others to the far away destinations. If possible talk to folks you know and trust who have already been to such exotic places as Costa Rica before you write that huge check.

Many booths are manned by fishing tackle manufacturers or stores that sell their gear. Many bargains are offered at the shows and are worth your careful consideration. Do your homework and look over catalogs that picture and explain the lures, rods, reels, or electronics you want. Often buy one, get one free offers are on the table, as are 50% off retail or more. Be sure you do the rounds of the

entire show before you make a major purchase because the same item might be available elsewhere for an even lower price! Free catalogs are always offered and going the first day and reading up to return later for the purchase of a major acquisition is a sound cautious financial procedure.

Be sure to look at the schedule of guest speakers for these shows the programs will include professional anglers, scientists, and other experts that will teach you incredible tips and pointers that will put more fish in the cooler. Plan your time to see those who speak on the fish species and topics that intrigue you. There unfortunately are a lot of eclectic distracting booths at these shows that want to sell you magazines, siding, stocks, alternative power sources, etc. They paid for the booth space so God bless them, but this scribe has always wanted to focus on angling only from collecting fishing Antiques to Zebco spin casters for kids.

Some non fishing aspects of the shows are excellent. The food venues can be awesome at these shows. The pickle booths are legendary as are the jerky stands, roasted nut corners and flavored popcorn tables. Some shows have specialty soups, creative barbecue coatings, novel pies, and inventive spices. Wineries from

local areas are represented. I love sampling and buying the delicious fish cakes and cured meats to purchase either in cans, packets, frozen boxes or fresh sealed plastic. A business associate new to our area from upstate New York sells items like Pepperoni rolls with cheddar cheese in the center and he can't keep the cooler full they are so popular! That's obviously my favorite! You can basically roam around and eat samples for free but WARNING, that will give you both heartburn and one gigantic thirst if you get carried away on the freebies. There are also beverages for sale to quench that, ranging from bottled water to ubiquitous beer stands and some bars with expensive hard stuff available. Don't overdo it because the police wait at the exits to follow any weaving show customer who had "too good a time".

The advice in this article is good for the rest of this cabin fever season and all the rest in the foreseeable future. Look for us at the H. R. F. A. booth at both shows. Show support for your organization and help us get more kids into fishing. Have fun and buy a bargain or two that will catch you a trophy! Enjoy all that you attend and bring a friend or two and at least one kid to introduce into fishing.





OPTIONAL ANGLER ACTIVITIES DURING "HIBERNATION MONTHS"

As I wish you a happy new year the weather is probably not one of the factors making you overly joyous as winter tightens its grip on the Northeast. You might not be one of the few chosen frozen willing to ice fish or chase steelhead on the Niagara River like some of us four season nuts. Also an expensive fishing vacation to the Caribbean would prove more of a wallet drain



than most budgets could survive. Instead, indoor angling distractions with beneficial purposes may be just what the doctor ordered. Below, then, are ten activities that civilized heat seeking men and women might chose to undertake while blizzards roar and ice blankets roads, walkways and power lines.

- A thorough check of all rod guides and tips to discover cracks, splits, rust, abrasions, and loose wrappings that could lead to damaged line and lost fish in the upcoming season. Rematching a quality guide or better yet upgrading when you replace a worn guide or tip will ensure your success odds are maximized when that trophy fish is battling to escape.
- 2. Organize and label lures, flies, spinners etc. Buy quality tackle boxes that can be labeled and stored in soft pack tackle bags and easily read to see what is stored in each. Set up special lure/tackle bags just for bass, panfish, pike walleye, salmon, trout etc. Do the same for salt water such as stripers/bluefish, bottom fish, surf angling, off shore trolling, etc.
- 3. Put new mono or braid on all reels that were heavily used or at least reverse the line by winding onto a lathe and re-spooling off the dowel. Tape the test of the new line in a place that is visible but won't wear off.
- 4. Build some lures or floats from your holiday wine corks. With a drill. Dremel tool, and safety razor you can shape and sand poppers, floats, and other lures, then paint them and put the desired hooks on your very own creations. Super gluing doll eyes, adding legs and feathers all make the floating enticements better.
- 5. Go through your spoon drawer or hit the garage sales for cheap used silver spoons and make your own spoons. Drill holes in the top and bottom to wind in top quality stainless rings and use the right hook sizes and type matched for the quarry you seek. (Have some old silver polish ready to shine up your spoons and doctor them further with decals that add reflecting tapes that glow and flash).
- 6. Tie Flies- If you never learned to do this it's never too late to try. I am still a "butcher" yet my purple nurple salmon flies are all over the world catching salmon because they work! Some people are artists with fly making then there are those of us who make flies that catch fish. You can too! Talk to respected club experts John Golon and Al Sternberg for more help.
- 7. Heat gun soft plastic "Franken creatures"- There's nothing like creating a monster lure from odd pieces of plastic! Not only can you thread pieces of rubber band through rubber worms for awesome wiggling legs but heat gunning small grubs to large bodies and bigger ones to back parts can create frogs, tadpoles and bog creatures that never existed yet elicit strikes anyhow.
- 8. Mark all your rods and reels in a secret place to prove ownership- I also tape a yellow strip of electrical tape around the butt of all my rods so I can easily spot them in a crowd at the boat rail or in the fallen leaves. More than once I've had to confront an individual who thought that my gear was "his", until I could prove my undisputable ownership.
- 9. Build a chum bucket holder out of a plastic milk carton- Get a Red or Orange swim noodle and cut it to perimeter size around the top of the milk crate. Fasten with quality zip ties. From the four corners run parachute cord to a central swivel that will run a line up to the fishing boat. You will need to wire lead sinkers or weights to the central bottom of the milk crate to keep it steady and in position during rougher seas.
- 10. Ready your car for extreme winter driving- Carrying extra salt and sand and the weight it gives in the back of your vehicle is wise. Top level windshield fluid to the lowest below zero factor in the back too. Carry a survival bag with sleeping bag, food bars. water and flash lights.

On January 25th a group of us went to Minnesota for the 30th anniversary of the Brainerd Jaycees Ice Fishing Extravaganza. The winning fish was an 8.29 lb. eelpout (see photo) or burbot.





It is also known as "Minnesota Lobster" because of its firm flesh, high fat content and mild, buttery taste. This fish is a member of the cod family and can be cooked using almost any method.

INGREDIENTS
two eelpout (a.k.a. burbot)

- ground and/or cracked pepper & salt to taste
- 1 lemon sliced
- olive oil
- fresh parsley

PREPARATION

Step 1: Rinse your fish with cool running water to remove any scales or stray bits of skin. Pat dry with paper towels. Preheat oven to 425 degrees

Step 2: Season both sides of the fillets with table salt and fine ground pepper. You may also use cracked pepper and table salt to add texture.

Step 3: Trim the fish so that each piece of fish is no thicker than about 1-1 ½ inches to ensure the outside does not char before the inside is cooked through.

Step 4: In a shallow square baking dish, coat the bottom with olive oil. Layer fish in baking dish, squeeze fresh lemon and drizzle with olive oil.

Step 5: Cook fish for 5 minutes for every inch of thickness.

Step 6: Garnish with fresh parsley and sliced lemon and enjoy!

HRFA History LOOKING BACK IN TIME



Among the items he brought in January were several past issues of the *underwater naturalist* the Bulletin of the American Littoral Society. In one (Vol. 20, No. 2) there was an article "Along Came a Spider" written by me. (Available upon request.)

In the other (Vol. 26, No. 3) there was an article written by Pam Carlson, who was succeeded by **Jeff Dement** when she retired as Tagging Editor years back. Here is an excerpt and photo from Pam's "Tales Taggers Tell III" ...

Longest Striper Return

It is always exciting when a recapturing fisherman sends in an old tag. In August of 1999, a striped bass was recaptured at East Rockaway Inlet, NY, carrying a tag that had been placed 5/24/88 at the Verrazano Bridge ... a time span of eleven years and three months. This record held until August 7, 2002 when Michael Letavic caught a 45" striped bass in Fishers Island Sound, CT. This fish was originally tagged by Tony Evangelista on 11/25/90 in the East River, New York Cty at 13", and so the new record stands at eleven years, eight months and thirteen days. Tony, who is also a member the Hudson river FIshermen's Association, has tagged with us since 1987, one of many longtime taggers.
